The roots were also used to treat fevers and the leaves were used as a treatment for upset stomach and an antiseptic wash

# Common Problems

It is important to know the common problems different plants in your garden may experience so that you can better manage the issues and ensure your plants are providing the ascetics you desire.

The Button Blazing Star is relatively disease and pest resistant. Occasionally, the plants can experience leaf spot or powdery mildew late in the season but these are rarely a devastation problem. However, avoid planting these flowers in low areas with poor drainage as the roots rot easily is wet soils.

# **Plant Requirements and Description**

# Mature Height and Spread:

3 feet tall

## **Growth Rate:**

Fast

## **Light Requirement:**

Full Sun or Partial Shade

#### Other Requirements:

Planting space 10-18' Well drained soil

## **Description:**

The Button Blazing Star is also known as Gayfeather or prairie Blazing Star, has rigid spikes of fluffy flowers. One of the usual characteristics is that the flowers bloom from the top down rather than the bottom up, making them a great cut flower, because as the old flowers at the top begin to look spent, they can just be snipped off and the stalk will continue putting out fresh blooms farther down the stem.

These flowers bloom from July-October and are best displayed in the back of an arrangement since it is taller than most flowers and the vivid color will draw attention through the arrangement.

# **Management**

- Keep plants well-spaced & weed free.
   Spacing helps reduce humidity in the foliage which prevent fugal growth.
- Planting plants in a sunny location. In addition, to photosynthetic health of your flowers, this also helps dry out any moisture and prevent fungal growth.
- Dividing them every 3 to 4 years.
- Cut back the flower stalks. This not only helps with spreading but can induce blooming.
- Water the plants from the bottom. Watering plants from the bottom is a wise practice no matter the plant. This prevents excess moisture on the leaves which can lead to fungal growth or scotching from the sun.
- Remove any & all infected plant parts. Make sure not to compost any infected plant parts as the fungal spores can be spread by wind or water.
